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


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1. Impact Factor

The impact factor of Asia-Pacific Journal of Public Health has increased. The 2013 impact factor for APJPH is 1.111. APJPH is ranked 114/160 in the Public, Environmental & Occupational Health category in the Science Index and 93/136 in the Social Science Index of the 2013 Thomson Reuters Journals Citation Report (ISI).

We are working towards improving the impact factor by having quality papers, review papers in all issues, additional Supplement and Special issues along with the regular issues.

2. Manuscript Update

- The number of articles published and the number of pages for the past 6 years is given in the Table 1. There are 300 papers that are accepted for publication that are not yet published in print (Table 2). However, most of them are already in the APJPH Online First.
- With the new contract that has just been signed, the number of pages per issue has now been increased from 60 pages to 110 pages (average of 10 articles per issue) in 2014.
- SAGE has implemented a submission fee of USD25 effective from August 2014.
 However, for the supplement issues and for articles which are invited such as commentary and reviews, this fee will be waived.
- In an effort to publish topical papers, we have been publishing themed issues. In January we published articles on infectious diseases, and in March we published articles on sexual and reproductive health, in May on oral health, July with no theme but focusing on new manuscripts and in September on Nutrition. The September issue has already been published and is available to view online.
- Due to the backlog of papers, the number of issues will be increased to 8 from next year. The publication months are January, March, **April**, May, July, September, **October** and November (new issue months in bold).

3. Rapid Rejections of Manuscripts: 2014

As we are receiving increased number of online submission of manuscripts, the editorial board is doing an initial screening of the articles based on the appropriateness and relevance. Only quality papers are selected and sent for peer reviewing as this has an effect on the impact factor of the Journal.

As shown in Table 3 this year (from Jan to Aug 2014) we received a total of 749 papers. The total number of paper rejected is 545. **The Rejection Rate calculated is 72.8%.**

4. Supplement Issues

a) Wuhan Conference Supplement 2014 (45th APACPH Conference at Wuhan University)

As there is some delay, this Supplement Issue will only be published in early 2015. We are at the moment still receiving the papers as there are still pages to fill. There are 14 papers which are in peer reviewing. There are 2 papers which are already accepted for publication.

b) Supplement Issue – Institute of Public Health (IKU), Malaysia (Sept 2014)

This issue is scheduled for publication in September 2014. All the 12 papers have been accepted for publication. The guest editorial is written by Dr Boris Pavlin, Prof Osman Ali and Assoc Prof Bee Koon Poh. The editorial is written by Professors Colin Binn and Wah Yun Low. All these have been sent to the Production Editor, Aparna Prusty of Sage Publication. This Supplement has already been published with our regular issue.

c) Supplement Issue – United Nations University – International Institute for Global Health

The United Nations International Institute for Global Health (UNU-IIGH) conducted a symposium and workshop on Global Environmental Change and Human Health in January 2013. The organisation is interested in publishing the papers that were presented during the event in a Supplement issue with the journal.

All the 8 papers have been sent for peer reviewing. This issue is scheduled for publication in early 2015.

d) Commemorative Issue 2015 – Tribute to Professor Walter Patrick

There is a proposal for a commemorative issue early 2015 to pay tribute to Prof Walter. A number his colleagues have been invited to contribute short reviews of approximately 2000 words on topics that were relevant to the life's work of Prof Walter. So far we have received tributes written by 1) Prof Colin and Prof Low 2) Prof Osman Ali 3) Prof Awang Bulgiba 4) Prof Tony Chiang 5) Prof Jay Maddock.

e) Sponsorship of Backlog Articles

The 2 Institutions KCDC (Korea Center for Disease Control and Prevention) and HIRA (Health Insurance Review & Assessment Series) are sponsoring the 5 Supplement Issues which will include the backlog of the unpublished articles and their own articles. Each issue will have a theme. The themes are 1) Communicable Disease 2) Non Communicable Disease 3) Universal Health Coverage 4) Quality of Care 5) Global Health. Prof So Yoon Kim of Yonsei University is taking the lead for this Supplement Issue.

f) Sponsorship by China Medical Board (CMB)

Requests are made Dr Lincoln Chen of CMB for sponsoring of Asia-Pacific Journal of Public Health in the following ways:

(i) Sponsoring a Special issue once a year:

Sponsoring a Special Issue on primary care concerns in the Asia-Pacific region every year. We have asked if CMB would consider sponsoring this annual Special issue. The cost of the Special Issue is approximately \$20,000 per issue.

(ii) Backlog articles:

Requested for a one-off grant from CMB for an electronic Issue to help clear the backlog articles. The cost is estimated to be \$30,000. We are negotiating with Sage Publications whether this is possible as it is electronic.

(iii) Sponsoring joint CMB-APJPH workshops on research writing and publishing in our neighbouring countries Laos, Myanmar, Vietnam, Mongolia and rural areas of China.

g) Supplement Issue Ascend (Asian Collaboration for Excellence in Non-Communicable Disease) Research Network

This Supplement Issue is proposed by Prof Brian Oldenburg of University of Melbourne which may be published in October 2015. This issue is funded by NIH, USA and thus it has to be open accessed as required by NIH. Negotiations with Sage Publications are still going on.

6. Journal Funding 2014

For this year we have been allotted a total of USD 20,000. The first installment of USD 7000 was sent by EFT from the Taiwan Cooperative Bank. We have received the balance of USD 13,000 in June 2014.







The following pie chart provides a geographic snapshot of *APJPH*'s organizational subscribers by region, exclusive of the developing world distribution:










In 2013, *APJPH*'s SAGE Track site received 1,182 new manuscript submissions. We estimate this to be a 2% decrease over the 1,209 new submissions received in 2012. *APJPH*'s rejection rate was 95.30% in 2013. These statistics may vary from those kept by the editorial office due to how manuscripts are counted and how rejection rates are calculated. As of July 2014, *APJPH*'s new Impact Factor (IF) is 1.111. The journal is ranked 114 out of 160 in the Journal Citation Report's Public, Environmental & Occupational Health category. 

The following table provides definitions for some the JCR metrics provided above.

Term	Definition
Impact factor	The impact factor is a measure of the importance of a journal and is calculated by dividing the number of citations in the JCR year by the total number of citable articles published in the two previous years.
Immediacy index	The average number of times an article is cited in the year it is published.
Cited half-life	The median age of articles that were cited in the JCR year.
Eigenfactor	This number measures the number of times articles from the journal published in the past five years have been cited in the JCR year. The Eigenfactor counts citations from journals in both the Science Citation Index and Social Science Citation Index and eliminates self-citations.
Article influence	The Eigenfactor score measures not just the number of citations, but the quality of citations as well. Citations from articles with few citations count more than citations from articles with many citations, which tends to even out different citation patterns between disciplines. Citations from journals that are heavily cited also count more than citations from journals that are rarely cited. Eigenfactor also removes self-citations from the calculation, a notable difference between Eigenfactor and impact factor. When all other metrics are equal, a journal's Eigenfactor score doubles when it doubles in size.
5-year impact factor	This number is similar to the impact factor but is based the number of times articles published in the past five years have been cited in the JCR year, rather than just the past two years.

APPENDIX I

Using social media to promote APJPH

- 1. Contribute to Wikipedia—We recognize that many students use Wikipedia as the starting point for their research. If there are pages that relate to themes, subjects, or research covered in your journal, add your journal as a reference, with a link to it on SAGE Journals. We have now also created a basic page for *APJPH*, which will increase the discoverability of your page, especially if you add additional content to it.
- 2. Join Facebook or LinkedIn—Setting up a Facebook page for your journal is a simple way of engaging with readers beyond the journal itself. SAGE can provide you with guidelines on how to make the most of your journal's presence on Facebook. LinkedIn is a network of professionals worldwide, with more than 55 million members. When setting up your profile, remember to mention your journal. You can also use the site to connect with authors you would like to publish or set up a group for your journal.
- 3. Upload videos and audio—User-generated and multimedia content—e.g., podcasts and YouTube videos—are an increasingly important research resource, especially for students. If you already have video content relevant to your journal or to specific articles please let us know and we will add it to the SAGE YouTube channel. If you are interested in further exploring multimedia content for your journal, please speak to your SAGE editor.



- 4. Join Twitter—Twitter is a micro-blogging service that enables its users to send and read short text-based messages known as tweets. Twitter allows you to set up search terms so you can monitor what is being discussed in your areas of interest—you can then participate in the relevant conversations. The more you engage, the more people will follow you to listen to your comments and recommendations. Since followers come to you, rather than you approaching them, Twitter is an ideal way to reach new audiences. SAGE has guidelines to support setting up and using Twitter. Should you have an existing Twitter account, please let us know and we will re-tweet your content.
- 5. Join academic social networking sites—Academics, researchers, and students use online social communities as a way of meeting and exchanging ideas with people who share the same research interests. These sites offer an immediate way to monitor what other people are looking at in your field or as a way to commission papers around online conversations. If there aren't any groups discussing



- commission papers around online conversations. If there aren't any groups discussing your research interests, set one up. Take a look at Academia.edu, Mendeley.com, or ResearchGate.net.
- **6. Start blogging**—Linking journals to blogs is an excellent way of enhancing discoverability. Search engines, such as Google, rate blogs highly when determining page rankings. There are various ways in which you can get involved.
 - Start a blog dedicated to your journal to provide an interactive forum for discussing articles, features, and developments. This could be a great way of encouraging the wider community to engage with the journal's content. SAGE can provide a blogging template and guidelines—please get in touch if you would like further information.
 - Create your own personal blog. Wondering what to write about? What about developments in your area of research, including
 - Papers that you have published—and/or other related papers in your field of research?
 - Conferences and training events where vou're due to speak?
 - Any interesting questions that came up at the last conference you attended?
 - O What you think of any recent press coverage of your subject area?
 - Identify any bloggers in your field and participate in discussions by posting comments—don't forget to link to your journal!
- 7. Engage with other websites—Which websites do you visit regularly? Do you participate in online discussions or are you a member of any groups that send you email newsletters or updates? Your journal (or specific articles) could feature on these—why not post a message to your discussion group with a link to your journal, or ask the editor of the email newsletter to include a mention of your latest issue if it is relevant to an online discussion?
