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Introduction

"Collaborating Centres for Health Promotion" (hereafter as CCHP) was established in August 2017 within "Asia Pacific Academic Consortium for Public Health" (APACPH) to provide a mutual learning platform for enhancing capacity building and leadership in the field of health promotion.

CCHP identifies areas to build human capacity in the core competencies of health promotion and aims to strengthen capacity and knowledge of the health promotion workforce in the Asia Pacific Region by disseminating health promotion principles, strategies, practices, and spreading evidence-based measures in the region. Also, CCHP provides partnering institutions, including Australia, Indonesia, Japan, Malaysia, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Taiwan and Thailand, with training opportunities and technical support.

Therefore, CCHP planned a 7-day "Asia Pacific Health Promotion Capacity Building Workshop" scheduled to hold in October 28th to November 3rd, 2018 in Taiwan. The training workshop will invite health promotion related professionals in the region to join together. The objectives of the workshop as well as target populations are as follows (See more information in Appendix 1).

A. Objectives

- To share and update public/global health knowledge, policy, services and best practices among health promotion workforce in the Asia Pacific Region
- To enhance professionalism and competence of health promotion workforce in the Region
- To provide a platform for discussing significant public health issues associated with health promotion capacity building in the region
- To establish an effective training model for regional academic and research capacity building in the field of health promotion

B. Target Participants

We plan to invite 32-35 junior public health scholars and mid-to-upper-level public health officers who are in charge of non-communicable disease prevention and control, including 20 participants from Taiwan and 12-15 participants from other APACPH countries.

Taiwan CCHP Training Modules and Activities

The training modules are a combination of project-based and team-based learning. Both trainers and trainees will bring their health promotion projects to the workshop for discussion. Workshop trainees will be required to complete assigned reading and submit an abstract for the health promotion project prior to the workshop. The lecturers/trainers will demonstrate core competencies for health promotion in a best practice project with a focus on the essential core competencies identified by the CCHP: program planning, implementation and evaluation; partnership building; and diversity and inclusiveness special for the Asia-Pacific region. The trainees will utilize what they learn from the trainers' presentations and group discussions to revise and refine their working projects. Details about the training activities are described as follows and illustrated in Table 1 Taiwan CCHP Training Program Schedule.

- Core Competency in Health Promotion Lectures: Three key trainers—Dr, Bruce Maycock, Curtin University, Australia; Dr. Wah Yun Low, University of Malaya, Malaysia; Dr. Masamine Jimba, The University of Tokyo, Japan—will demonstrate core competencies for health promotion with a focus on three core competencies in health promotion, the most essential ones identified by the CCHP. The demonstration time for each lecture is about 60 minutes.
- Case Experience Sharing: Additional nine trainers (See Table 2. Lists of CCHP Lecturers and Trainers) were invited from 5 APACPH countries to share a health promotion project and/or lead individual group discussions. Each trainer will present a national health-promotion-related project to demonstrate the important role of the three core competencies. The duration for each case section is about 10 minutes, followed by a 20-minute Q & A session.
- Individual Group Discussion: Taiwan CCHP Workforce will review Trainees' project abstracts and divide trainees into 4 groups (8-9 trainees per group). Trainees are required to improve their working project based on what they have learned from the workshop and encouraged to submit a case report for publication in an academic journal such as Asia Pacific Journal of Public Health.
- Presentation: Each group has 20 minutes to present 2 revised projects, followed by a 10-minute Q & A session. In the remaining 40 minutes, trainers will comment on the projects and learning through group dynamics.
- Field Teaching Visits: We plan to arrange Field Teaching Visits on the first day afternoon and the fourth day.
- Cultural Tour: We plan to arrange a cultural tour on the last day of the workshop.

CCHP Strategic Meetings and Workshop Training Module Development Meetings

In order to form taskforce, develop training modules and materials, several strategic meetings and workshop training module development meetings were held including one held during APACHP Executive Council Meeting in Tokyo, Japan, in March 2018. In this Strategic meeting, CCHP workshop task force was formed by members of Taiwan CCHP and key lecturers of CCHP October Workshop. Thereafter, several meetings were held to develop and discuss training modules. Details about each meeting are listed below and described in details in Table 3. A. Training Module :

- 1. Due to the large scope of health promotion, we narrowed down the topic to non-communicable disease prevention, which includes lifestyle and chronic disease management. We will decide the topic after we confirm the list of trainees.
- 2. We had come to a consensus with lecturers on course lecture topics and the training modules.

Finalizing the list of trainees is the first priority. To know who the participants are, where they work, what their projects are, and how much they know about the three core competencies will help lectures to prepare relevant teaching materials.

B. Project Abstract Format

- 1. We will ask lecturers to review the project abstract format and provide edits and comments.
- 2. All projects should try to address at least one or two core competencies. There will be instructions written, asking trainees to elaborate on "partnership building competencies" and "Asia–Pacific regional diversity and inclusiveness".
- 3. Both trainees and lecturers must submit a project abstract before early October.

C. Training Workshop Final Product

- 1. Lecturers recommended that we collect 7-10 trainees' case reports and compile them into a book/eBook form. By doing so, this book can be a valuable reference for future training workshops and people from other countries who do not participate in this workshop can utilize these case reports. Also, academic journals rarely take in case reports.
- 2. Dr. Wang suggested that many famous academic journals do publish case reports. Moreover, our workshop can collect many health promotion case reports and publish it as a case series, which is more unique.

D. Training Workshop Evaluation

- 1. Trainees will complete a pre-workshop readiness assurance test, such as an on-line test on the CCHP website. This test will help lecturers understand trainees' state of preparation.
- 2. Get the baseline information of trainees' recognition of the three core competencies prior to the workshop. Baseline information can be the foundation of our workshop's evaluation—we would know how much they've grown after the training.
- 3. Both trainees and lecturers must complete a post-workshop evaluation questionnaire.

Action items and agendas for the next meeting:

- 1. Finalize the list of trainees.
- 2. Revise the format of project abstract according to lecturers' suggestions. Will confirm the final version of the abstract format in the next meeting.
- 3. Set a timetable for lecturers and trainees' project abstract submission, assigned reading ready for trainees, pre-workshop assessment/evaluation survey, readiness assurance test, etc.
- 4. Plan and develop pre- and post-workshop assessment/evaluation and readiness assurance test.
- 5. Discuss the form of the final product—whether to publish a case series in academic journals or collect case reports into a book form.
- 6. Narrow down the topic of the workshop after we confirm the list of trainees.
